Our prayerful home offers a comfortable and peaceful environment for women to contemplate where God is calling them.

Each year, University of Mary students are invited to tour the monastery as part of their courses. They learn about the mission and guiding principles of our community. Students are always welcome to



She quotes a favorite verse from the prologue of the Rule of Benedict: 49-50: "As we progress in this way of life and in faith, we shall run on the path of God's commandments, our hearts overflowing with the inexpressible delight of love." She adds, "I think I know what that is."


### Sister Moireen Kelly ~ 75 Years



od and music are woven throughout Sister Moireen's years as a Benedictine Sister. Like notes on a musical score, she marks her 75 years of monastic profession with joy and appreciation.

Sister Moireen joined the Sisters of St. Benedict, St. Joseph, Minn., and made her first monastic profession on July 11, 1935, and began her lifelong ministry as a music teacher, choir director and organist. She was sent to Bismarck to teach music in schools and give piano lessons.

Sister Moireen earned her Bachelor of Arts degree from the College of St. Benedict. When the Benedictine Sisters of Annunciation Monastery founded a new independent community in Bismarck, she transferred her commitment from St. Benedict's to Annunciation Monastery.





When the sisters opened Priory High in Bismarck in 1959, Sister Moireen taught choir and was assigned the position of procurator. She oversaw the furnishing of the cafeteria and rooms. She recalls, "The furniture had been ordered by world-renowned architect Marcel Breuer himself!"

She continued in her music ministry for 31 years at Annunciation Monastery and the University of Mary, where she was a faculty member for 15 years. She was organist for her monastic community until her retirement in 2007.

Sister Moireen says her life as a Benedictine Sister continues to be fulfilling. She has made the Benedictine motto, "prayer and work" her own throughout her life. She says, "Every day, to the best of my ability, I try to do ordinary things extraordinarily well."



#### Sister Joanne Graham ~ 50 Years

ister Joanne has served in leadership positions throughout her life as a Benedictine sister. She was called to serve as a nurse, nurse educator, hospital administrator, prioress of Annunciation Monastery, and vice chancellor and chancellor of the Bismarck Diocese. At the time she was appointed chancellor by Bishop John F. Kinney, she was one of six women in the United States to serve in that position in the Church. She also served as vice chancellor of the Diocese of St. Cloud, Minn.

Early on, Sister Joanne had an interest in health care. She earned a nursing diploma from St. Elizabeth School of Nursing, Lincoln, and a bachelor's degree in nursing education from St. Louis University, St. Louis, Mo.

She recalls, "There was a tugging in my heart that I was trying to deny," and she began to consider a religious vocation. She felt drawn to the Benedictine charism and before long she was boarding a plane to a place she'd never been before -- Annunciation Monastery and the prairies of North Dakota. She felt connected to was received as a postulant in December of 1958 and made her monastic profession as a

these sisters and was received as a postulant in December of 1958 and made her monastic profession as a Benedictine Sister of Annunciation Monastery on July 11, 1960.

Sister Joanne taught at the St. Alexius School of Nursing and worked in obstetric nursing when prioress Mother Edane asked her to pursue a master's degree in hospital administration. She did so and earned her master's in 1966 from St. Louis University.

She returned to St. Alexius and served as administrator and president of the board, a position Sister Joanne held from June 1966 to May 1976. She was elected prioress of Annunciation Monastery in 1976 and served until her term ended in May 1980.

Sister Joanne was associate administrator at St. Alexius from 1980 to 1985 and Bishop John Kinney asked her to serve as vice chancellor of the Diocese of Bismarck in 1986. She later became chancellor of the Diocese and held this position until 2003. During this period, Sister Joanne earned a pontifical degree in canon law from The Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C.

Sister Joanne works with canonical matters for the Federation of St. Benedict and her monastic community. She is a member of the University of Mary Board of Trustees, a certified spiritual director and chair of Annunciation Monastery's Ministry of Sponsorship Group. The University of Mary awarded Sister Joanne an honorary doctorate in leadership in 2009.

"My greatest reward has been watching people, with whom I've ministered, develop their gifts and serve God," says Sister Joanne. She finds great joy in witnessing the recognition of gifts in others who then rise to the challenges of their ministry, just as she has been called to do over these past 50 years.

#### Sister Lawrence Fischer ~ 50 Years

aying "Yes" to God is central to Sister Lawrence's life of dedication and loving service to others. As treasurer of Annunciation Monastery for the past 32 years, Sister Lawrence began saying "yes" to God's will even before she became a Benedictine Sister.

With deep roots in southwestern North Dakota, Sister Lawrence graduated from Rhame Public High School. Gifted in many areas, she decided to pursue a degree in accounting and business at St. Benedict's College in St. Joseph, Minn. At St. Benedict's she became acquainted with more of the sisters and often attended Mass and Vespers.

A major turning point in her life occurred when Sister Lawrence attended the novice reception for a friend who was joining the Benedictine Sisters of Annunciation Monastery in Bismarck. When exchanging goodbyes, a friend asked, "Will you be in the novice class next year?" In a grace-filled moment, Sister Lawrence responded, "Well, yes!" She became a postulant with the Benedictine Sisters of Annunciation Monastery in December of 1958 and became a novice in June 1959.

Sister Lawrence attended the University of Mary and received her Bachelor of Arts in theology/philosophy with a double minor in business education and math. She taught math in Bismarck at Cathedral School, St. Mary's Central High School and Priory High. As business manager of the University of Mary, Sister Lawrence started the financial aid office and ran the bookstore.

In 1971 Sister Lawrence became bookkeeper and assisted with human resources and maintenance in the monastery business office. Six years later, she returned to school at Creighton University, Omaha, Neb., and earned her master's degree in business administration. She returned home to Annunciation Monastery and was appointed treasurer. Sister Lawrence also served on the St. Alexius Medical Center's Board of Directors for many years.

Sister Lawrence continues to provide leadership and witness as a "student in the Lord's service," in her ministry as treasurer for the monastic community. As she considers the blessings of the past 50 years, Sister Lawrence is still saying "Yes," to God. "We live our lives day by day and we continue following our call. I still feel God leading me where I am needed," she says.



You Fre a Beautiful Moman
by Sister Kathleen Atkinson (a reflection from Guatemala)



here was nothing magnanimous in the gesture. I was with a GOD's CHILD service team at Panajachel, Guatemala, and we were ordering breakfast when an elderly woman came to the door begging. As she walked on, I picked up my waffles and syrup packets and followed her.

It was a busy morning, but one man stopped long enough to simply say, "You are a beautiful woman." I translated it for my barefoot friend, giving her a gesture that said, "he told us we're beautiful women."

**You are a beautiful woman.** That is the message I want to communicate after taking part in a four-month field experience in Central America.

You are a beautiful woman, Maria Juliana. I hold her, bathe her, feed her at the Casa Jackson Home for Malnourished Infants. Rescued as a newborn from a dumpster, she has been with us since November and has a long way to go. But she's a fighter and is surrounded by people fighting with her. As I tell her of her beauty, I send a prayer out for her mother. A woman must be devastatingly desperate to abandon her child that way.

**You are a beautiful woman, Dora Luz.** Her tiny home is always open for family, Spanish students and service volunteers. I live with her these months and am grateful for her daily prayer wrapped with tortillas and frijoles. Taking in strangers from around the world is not only a necessity for family income, it is a true ministry of hospitality. Like mothers everywhere, she waves off attention with a smile and a shrug.

You are a beautiful woman, mother of Anita and Juan. I don't know her name because she often does laundry when the family arrives at the homeless shelter. She dresses them for school in the morning. Reviews their homework with them at night. Reminds them to say their meal prayer. She works in the day while they're at school, carrying their family belongings in a black garbage bag. Coming "home" every night to the shelter. Home is a mattress in the corner of a crowded room.

Before I try to confront systems and persons stripping women (and men) of the beauty with which they were created, I am living and learning with them. Often my own heart is broken open with what I experience.

God's beauty surprises me there, too.

### In Loving Memory...



Sister Bernadette Fisher Born: January 5, 1917 Professed: July 11, 1938 Died: December 20, 2009

A much beloved teacher for over 45 years, Sister Bernadette taught elementary grades and served as a principal. She often went beyond the call of duty to help her students. She worked at St. Alexius Medical Center in various programs and established the medical library. She also served as secretary for the monastic community and did meal preparation at St. Alexius Convent.

She had a grateful, generous and optimistic spirit and was always willing to help wherever she could. For many years, she collected cancelled stamps to help missionary activities. She loved to read, write letters and do crossword puzzles.

Deeply devoted to God and others, she will be missed by those whose lives she touched.



Sister Edane Volk

Born: October 12, 1908 Professed: July 11, 1928 Died: December 21, 2009

Sister Edane was a founder and the second prioress of Annunciation Monastery from 1953-66. She was the first president of the University of Mary. Under her leadership, the Benedictines built a new monastery designed by architect Marcel Breuer, began the University of Mary, staffed a number of Catholic schools and opened rural hospitals. She saw great growth at St. Alexius Medical Center and Garrison Memorial Hospital.

With the love of music in her heart, she spent 25 years teaching music and playing the organ in schools and churches in Dickinson and Mandan.

Sister Edane was grounded in her love for monastic life and deeply reliant on the sustaining grace of God.



Sister Florence Marquart Born: August 6, 1922 Professed: July 11, 1942 Died: January 14, 2010

Sister Florence was among the pioneering sisters who founded Annunciation Monastery. She served in a variety of ministries including occupational therapy, central supply in hospitals and switchboard operator. She spent 33 years in her favorite ministry of caring for the sacred vessels and vestments of the church and setting up for church services.

She will be especially remembered for her gentle smile, deep faith in God and her reverent care of places of worship.



Sister Rachel Mayer Born: August 23, 1935 Professed: July 11, 1958 Died: March 17, 2010

Sister Rachel taught for ten years at Christ the King School, Mandan, and served 38 years at Cathedral School and parish in Bismarck, where she prepared hundreds of children for the sacraments of reconciliation, communion, and confirmation, and coordinated children's liturgies. She started and directed RCIA for many years. It was life-giving for her to accompany people on their faith journey. She was also committed to her ministry as monastery archivist. Sister Rachel enjoyed crocheting and was a loyal fan of her favorite sports teams.

In her kind, patient and organized manner, Sister Rachel brought children and adults deeper into the Catholic Church.
