ecause of your generous response to our sponsorship appeal, our sisters have been able to offer 20 sponsorship forums at St. Alexius Medical Center between December 16, 2008 and March 19, 2009. A record number of 800 staff and employees were in attendance. Sponsorship presenters were Sister Kathleen Atkinson and Sister Susan Lardy.

At the University of Mary, educational forums on sponsorship were presented to approximately 100 corporate faculty members in January. Sisters Kathleen Atkinson, Thomas Welder and Nancy Miller presented. Sister Joanne Graham, who serves as chair of Annunciation Monastery's Sponsorship Group, presented

to approximately 75 support staff in April. "Overall, there is a great relief that we Sisters have declared our commitment to future sponsorship of our institutions. My sense is that the topic has provided renewed energy and interest in sponsorship and new insights have been given to employees regarding its value and goals," says Sister Joanne.

"Sponsorship is a structured relationship through which Annunciation Monastery, in the name of the Catholic Church, directs and influences a health care or higher education ministry that meets a need and furthers the mission of Jesus."

Annunciation Monastery serves as the link that binds our sponsored ministries to a Catholic identity.

Our Ministry of Sponsorship enables us to practice our "hands on" presence, influence and oversight with the leadership, boards and administrative staffs of each of our sponsored institutions: St. Alexius Medical Center, Garrison Memorial Hospital and the University of Mary. ### Believing in Belize

ister Nancy Gunderson joined University of Mary theology students in a rare missionary experience in Belize. Located in the southern portion of the Yucatán Peninsula in Central America and bordering Mexico and Guatemala, Belize boasts dense jungles, markets and the second longest barrier reef, the Cays.

In an effort to spread the message of Jesus, Sister Nancy and the students served in the village of San Estevan, visiting door-todoor, teaching children in the classroom and providing supplies to the orphanage. They stocked a library of children's books and painted the school.

Praying Pelican Missions hosted the mission group. Much pre-trip preparation was required. Each missionary was allowed to take 50 lbs. of supplies to Belize. The missionaries' schedule was packed, with each day beginning promptly at 7 a.m. and ending at 11 p.m. After their eight-day ministry in Belize, missionaries were provided time for debriefing. As Sister Nancy explained, "There is no doubt we have been changed forever by this experience. She enjoyed connecting with the women of Belize and learning about their culture. "I felt humbled to experience their complete trust and openness to us," she remarked.

Why are we sharing this with you? We want you to know of our gratitude and show you how you are also making a difference through your support. Missionary experiences are part of our initial formation program. Our sisters participate in these experiences to serve the broader world and respond to the needs of its people.

In tribute to the Benedictine legacy and history in this 50th anniversary year for the University of Mary, a Doctor of Leadership *honoris causa* was awarded to Sister Joanne Graham. An honorary doctorate is the highest

honor bestowed by the University of Mary beyond the granting of earned degrees. Also receiving honorary doctoral degrees were: Sister Nancy Bauer, prioress of St. Benedict's Monastery, St. Joseph, MN, and Abbot John Klasson of St. John's Abbey, Collegeville, MN.

Sister Joanne has served as administrator of St. Alexius Medical Center, prioress of Annunciation Monastery, chancellor/assistant to the Bishop of the Diocese of Bismarck, and vice-chancellor for the Diocese of St. Cloud, MN. Having served on the University of Mary's board of trustees for over 30 years, she chairs the Joint Planning Task Force for Annunciation Monastery and the University of Mary. Sister Joanne has a nursing diploma from St. Elizabeth School of Nursing in Lincoln, NE. She holds a bachelor's degree in nursing education and a master's in hospital administration from St. Louis University, St. Louis, MO, as well as a Juris Canonici Licentiate (canon law) degree from The Catholic University of America, Washington, DC. Sister Joanne serves as canon lawyer for the Federation of St. Benedict and is a canonical consultant to monasteries, as well as a certified spiritual director through Annunciation Monastery's Hospitality Center. Sister Joanne chairs Annunciation Monastery's Sponsorship Group and is dedicated to continuing the legacy of the sisters' influence at their sponsored institutions (St. Alexius Medical Center, Garrison Memorial Hospital, the University of Mary) "to deepen and extend the mission of Jesus through the way health care and education are delivered for generations to come."

higher education, an honorary doctorate degree was conferred upon Sister Thomas—the Doctor of Humane Letters, *honoris causa*.

Sister Thomas, a Scholastica graduate, is one of the longest-tenured university presidents in American history, having served in this capacity at the University of Mary for over 31 years. Under her leadership, the school attained university status; tripled in size from 925 students to nearly 3,000; added many new academic programs including the university's first doctorate; expanded its adult learning program online and to 16 locations throughout the state, region and country; and made the move to NCAA Division II athletics. Sister Thomas attended the College of St. Benedict in St. Joseph, MN, received her bachelor's degree in music from the College of St. Scholastica, and earned a master's degree in music from Northwestern University in Evanston, IL. An active participant on many boards and community organizations, she has served as a director of St. Alexius Medical Center, MDU Resources Group, Inc., Bismarck-Mandan Development Association, as a member of the North Dakota Higher Education Roundtable, and on the board of trustees of the Missouri Slope Areawide United Way. She was awarded the Theodore Roosevelt Rough Rider Award by Gov. John Hoeven and has received the Greater North Dakotan Award as well as the 2007 Missouri Slope Areawide United Way's Lifetime of Caring Award.

# Fisters Celebrate 60 and 50 Years of Monastic Profession

#### Sister Rita Miller – 60 Years

ister Rita Miller will celebrate her 60th anniversary of monastic profession in a celebration with her monastic community the evening of July 11 at Annunciation Monastery.

A native of Hague, ND, Sister Rita (birth name Lorraine) was the fourth youngest of 13 children born to Engelbert and Agatha Miller. Her call to

become a sister was nurtured by her family and the Benedictine sisters who taught at Hague. She says of her childhood, "My mother was very religious; we all attended daily Mass and prayed the rosary together as a family." She recalls evenings of playing games, family dinners and hospitality toward guests.

After graduating from Hague High School in 1947, Sister Rita joined the Benedictine Sisters of Annunciation Monastery and made monastic profession in 1949. From 1952 to 1954, she worked as nursing supervisor at St. Alexius Medical Center. In 1952 she graduated from St. Alexius School of Nursing as a registered nurse. Sister Rita continued her education at Northwestern University, Chicago, IL, and graduated as a registered physical therapist in 1955. Her long ministry in health care began at St. Alexius where she started the Physical Therapy department. She served as director of

this department from 1956 to 1980.

After starting a new outreach physical therapy program and serving as director of the health center at Annunciation Monastery, Sister Rita returned to St. Alexius Medical Center in 1982. She was a surgical nurse for 12 years and later joined St. Alexius Home Health Care as a Hospice chaplain. She says that experience was truly rewarding. "Seeing Christ

in the dying, through their suffering, made me most aware of the suffering of Christ. It was a great growth experience to be a prayer partner, listener and support person. I loved the work of preparing them for their eternal home," she says.

Today, Sister Rita volunteers as hospitality hostess at St. Alexius Medical Center's Admitting department. She welcomes patients and families with her warm smile and comforting presence and directs them to their destination in the hospital. Sister Rita enjoys reading, making rosaries, gardening and caring for the birds in her yard at St. Alexius Convent.

"My deep relationship with God through prayer and community life enables me to do my best and let God do the rest," explains Sister Rita. "These past 60 years have gone by quickly and I will forever by grateful to God for the blessings of my ministries and my monastic community."

#### Sister Grace Dahmus - 50 Years

he family and religious community of Sister Grace Dahmus, will celebrate her 50 years of monastic profession during morning Eucharist on July 11, 2009 at the monastery.

"Called to serve, share, witness, console, proclaim, celebrate." That phrase from her scrapbook describes Sister Grace Dahmus' 50 years as a Benedictine sister of

Annunciation Monastery. Raised on a farm near Regent, ND, Sister Grace (birth name, Mary), was the fourth of eight children born to Rudolph and Catherine Dahmus. Her love of reading started early. She recalls spending countless hours sitting in her favorite tree reading books. "I read every single book in the cupboard of my school and read to my brothers and sisters often." Her alone time was also spent in thoughtful pondering about God. Having an uncle who was a priest and an aunt who was a Benedictine sister, she entertained thoughts of becoming a sister at the age of seven. "By the time I was in high school, the call became stronger and stronger."

In 1957, after graduating from high school, Mary entered Annunciation Monastery. She made her monastic profession in 1959.

There was a great need for teachers at that time, so Sister Grace was asked to become a teacher. She graduated from the University of Mary in 1969, and taught in diocesan and parochial schools at St. Mary's, Bismarck; St. Joseph's and Trinity Grade School in Dickinson, and St. Joseph's in Mandan. She attended Mundelein College in Chicago, IL, for religious education training.

For teaching sisters, there was no such thing as summer vacation. Sister Grace taught vacation Bible school in rural towns throughout North Dakota. She taught CCD classes, first communion and confirmation classes. She also taught summer school on the reservations of Fort Totten, Standing Rock and Fort Berthold. She has a great respect for the culture and people of the reservations.

After retiring from teaching, Sister Grace received training in Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) and served as hospital chaplain and in hospice and home health care at St. Joseph's Hospital in Minot and St. Alexius Medical Center.

Volunteerism has always been important to Sister Grace. She donated time and energy to the University of Mary library, Retired Seniors Volunteer Program (RSVP), in laundry services at St. Vincent's Care Center, and as a certified nurse aid (CNA) at Annunciation Monastery.

A farm girl at heart, Sister Grace enjoys the outdoors. She had been an avid reader all her life until macular degeneration made it too difficult to read. The gift of "Talking Books" allows her to continue her love of reading and keep connected to the world.

"My life has been richly blessed," says Sister Grace. "My prayer life and the support of my sisters in community sustains me through the joys and sorrows in life." Her favorite quote from Scripture is from Jeremiah 29:11, "I know my plans for you, declares the Lord, plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future."
